PREFACE

This Standard was prepared by the Joint Standards Australia/Standards New Zealand Committee CS-018, Safety of Children's Toys to supersede AS/NZS ISO 8124.3:2003, Safety of toys, Part 3: Migration of certain elements (ISO 8124-3:1997, MOD).

This Standard incorporates Amendment No. 1 (June 2016). The changes required by the Amendment are indicated in the text by a marginal bar and amendment number against the clause, note, table, figure or part thereof affected.

The objective of this Standard is to provide requirements to limit the bioavailability of certain elements resulting from the use of toys.

This Standard is an adoption with national modifications, and has been reproduced from ISO 8124-3:2010, *Safety of toys*—Part 3: *Migration of certain elements*, and its Amendment No. 1 (2014), which is added at the end of the source text. ISO 8124-3:2010 has been varied to take account of Australian/New Zealand conditions. Variations are set out in Appendix ZZ.

As this Standard is reproduced from an International Standard, the following applies:

- (a) In the source text 'this part of ISO 8124' should read 'this part of AS/NZS 8124'.
- (b) A full point substitutes for a comma when referring to a decimal marker.
