

# Basket trolleys —

# National foreword

This British Standard is the English language version of EN 1929-1:1998. It supersedes BS 7646:1993 which is withdrawn.

The UK participation in its preparation was entrusted to Technical Committee CW/51, Self service trolleys, which has the responsibility to:

- aid enquirers to understand the text;
- present to the responsible European committee any enquiries on the interpretation, or proposals for change, and keep the UK interests informed;
- monitor related international and European developments and promulgate them in the UK.

A list of organizations represented on this committee can be obtained on request to its secretary.

By custom and practice, an 18 kg load limit for the child carrying facility of a basket trolley, rather than the 15 kg specified in this standard, has been adopted in the UK. In the case where a customer wishes to specify this higher limit, increasing the tilt angle given in 5.4 to 12° will give an equivalent safety level for an 18 kg child.

Subclause 4.1.1. of this standard requires that trolleys with a child carrying facility shall not contain any part that may pinch, cut or injure the child. Tests have shown that gaps within the ranges 5 mm to 12 mm and 25 mm to 45 mm can cause injury through entrapment of fingers or limbs respectively. Further guidance can be found in CEN Report CR 13387:1999, *Child use and care articles — General and common safety guidelines*.
